

In Focus

Press under attack as Bangladeshi elections approach: Political tensions in Bangladesh are escalating ahead of the country's general elections scheduled for January 7, 2024, with journalists and media workers facing assault, intimidation and harassment amid a wave of government restrictions and electoral violence. Clashes between supporters of the opposition Bangladesh National Party (BNP) and police in the eastern Habiganj District on December 10 resulted in the injury of at least 50 people, with correspondents from My TV, Niranjan Goswami, and Desh TV, Amir Hamza, shot while covering the clash and <u>transferred</u> to Dhaka for medical care. On November 20, journalist Md Nahid Assan was <u>assaulted</u> in Dhaka by at least 20 activists from the ruling Awami League's youth and student wings after sharing his location while gathering information on a political clash. Chittagong Bureau of Independent Television Journalist Rakib Uddin was verbally and physically abused by a former Awami League politician and his supporters on November 30 while covering an election registration. His equipment was reportedly damaged and confiscated. Through October and early November, the IFJ monitored attacks on $\underline{\text{at least 30 journalists}}$ during a BNP protest, as well as $\underline{\text{threats}}$ and $\underline{\text{assaults}}$ of campus correspondents in universities across the country. With the BNP rejecting the elections as undemocratic, the impact of Bangladesh's political polarization will be seen through the coming month.

The Region

IFJ launches 2023 killed and jailed list: On December 8, the IFJ released its annual list of killed and jailed journalists worldwide, recording the deaths of 94 journalists and media workers. Of the seven currently confirmed cases from the Asia-Pacific region, four were from South Asia in India (1), Afghanistan (2) and Bangladesh (1). In India, a Special Investigation Team concluded in May that real estate broker Pandharinath Amberkar had murdered Mahrarshtra journalist Shashikant Warishe, after injuries the journalist sustained proved fatal after Amberkar deliberately struck him with his vehicle on February 7. Amberkar targeted Warishe after an article accused the land broker of engaging in criminal activity and highlighted the links between him and leading politicians. In Afghanistan, journalist Sayed Hosein Naderi and media student Akmal Nazari were killed after a parcel bomb detonated at the Tabyan Cultural Centre in Afghanistan's northern Balkh province during a celebration of Afghanistan's media workers on March 11. 16 journalists and media workers were also injured in an attack claimed by the Islamic State. In Bangladesh, Golam Rabbani Nadim, correspondent for Ekattor TV, Daily Manabjamin, and Banglanews24.com died after being attacked by a group of assailants on June 14 in Jamalpur, with politician Mahmudul Alam Babu arrested alongside 16 other suspects. Nadim's murder came months after the journalist published a series of articles about Babu. Additionally, the IFJ highlights the alarming increase in imprisoned journalists, with 393 currently behind bars, of which 19 are from South Asia.

Gaza Media Update - December 2023

Since November 15, 23 Palestinian and two Lebanese journalists have been killed by Israeli airstrikes, bombardments, and snipers, bringing the total number of slain journalists to 71 since October 7. This month, the IFJ and its affiliate, the Palestinian Journalists Syndicate (PJS) have lobbied the International Criminal Court (ICC) to take action against the killings of journalists in Gaza. This month, IFJ General Secretary Anthony Bellanger undertook a mission to Ramallah in the West Bank in support of the IFJ's affiliate, the Palestinian Journalists Syndicate (PJS), with representatives from the PJS calling on the International Criminal Court in December to denounce the mass killings of journalists and media workers in Gaza. The IFJ and the PJS published a safety advisory in English and Arabic for journalists, while the IFJ's Safety Fund has paid for medical kits, equipment battery packs, and direct financial assistance. National Issues

Afghanistan: The Afghanistan Journalists Center (AFJC) <u>published</u> a report on November 18 detailing 75 media freedom incidents between March 21 and November 17, comprised of 33 arrests and 42 incidents of threats or harassment. Through this period, the majority of media rights violations have been made by representatives from the Taliban's intelligence directorate and other agencies. The AFJC further pointed to the impact of the Taliban's 13 directives as highly detrimental to press freedom and freedom of information.

Bhutan: From 2021 to 2023, the total amount of journalists in Bhutan has decreased by 37 per cent, according to a new survey by news outlet Kuensel, with only four out of 15 vacancies filled in the past two years. 66 per cent of those who

Bangladesh: On November 30, human rights organisation VOICE conducted a consultation meeting in Dhaka to enhance collaboration and share understandings of online safety and privacy for journalists, women, and human rights defenders online. The importance of a strong legal framework for personal data and privacy in Bangladesh was stressed, with a focus on public awareness, moral values, and digital rights education. The session was organised as a part of a broader journalist safety and professional capacity program.

India: In a landmark legal decision,
Kashmir Walla editor Fahad Shah was
granted bail on November 23 after over
600 days in custody, with the Jammu and
Kashmir High Court citing a lack of
evidence under the Unlawful Activities
Prevention Act. On December 12, the

low salaries and a lack of professional development opportunities as the two leading reasons for their departure. Insecure work and a lack of professional freedom were also identified by over half of the respondents.

Maldives: In a letter made public on November 17, Human Rights Watch <u>urged</u> the newly elected Maldivian leader Mohamed Muizzu to prioritise the protection and promotion of human rights through his presidency. The organisation <u>outlined</u> an agenda with recommendations in seven key areas, including enforcing environmental laws, amending laws related to peaceful assembly and evidence, repealing criminalization of same-sex conduct, strengthening judicial independence, and ensuring accountability for past crimes.

Pakistan: The Pakistan Electronic Media Regulatory Authority (PEMRA), has directed all satellite television channels to adhere to its code of conduct and desist from the broadcast of 'speculative' or 'false' information ahead of national elections in 2024. PEMRA said that false information or media content about the general elections may be met with strict action against channels violating these guidelines.

failure of law enforcement to produce a detention order made the detention illegal.

Nepal: Nepal's Prime Minister, Pushpa Kamal Dahal, has <u>expressed</u> openness to reconsidering the nation's newly instated ban on social media platform TikTok, stating that the decision is not final. The ban, implemented on November 13, was prompted by pressure from coalition partners. Acknowledging public reactions to the ban, Prime Minister Dahal suggested the possibility of regulating TikTok, similar to existing measures in other social media platforms.

Sri Lanka: During a parliamentary debate on December 8, National People's Power lawmaker Anura Kumara
Dissanayake <u>called</u> for journalists to be paid a salary in line with the cost of living. He highlighted financial difficulties faced by many journalists in the country and emphasised that current allowances provided by media institutions are insufficient. MP Dissanayake warned of a potential information blackout if media institutions, crucial for disseminating information, are forced to shut down due to financial constraints.

IFJ At Work

WMFP launches campaign for gender equality in Pakistan's media: On the eve of Pakistan's press club elections starting this month, a growing network of women journalists is pushing for much needed reforms within the media industry to represent them more equitably. A new campaign launched today by the Women's Media Forum Pakistan (WMFP) is calling first on press clubs, unions, and media news outlets to genuinely commit to a 'change agenda' at all levels. IFJ guides Afghan journalist advocacy: On November 22, the **IFJ** <u>attended</u> a coordination meeting held by UNESCO in Brussels, collaborating and guiding the future of Afghan media support and safety initiatives alongside a panel of media and journalists' NGOs. Joint priorities emerging from the initiative include enhanced cooperation, advocacy efforts, and support to women journalists, diaspora media, and those still in Afghanistan. The role of the media in highlighting on-the-ground issues in Afghanistan and in pressuring the Taliban to end its repression of women's and human rights was also highlighted.

Pakistan coordinators hold gender trainings: Following the IFJ's Training of Trainers (TOT) in Islamabad in September, participants and Women's Media Forum Pakistan (WMFP) coordinators have planned and conducted a series of regional gender trainings in Karachi, Islamabad, Lahore, and Peshawar through late November and early December. The trainings were held in press clubs and attended by over 60 participants, focusing on a central theme of gender equality and safety.

Featured Actions

MJA call for end to impunity in joint statement: On November 28, the Maldives Journalists Association, alongside the IFJ and four other press freedom and human rights organisations, Launched a joint statement calling on Maldivian authorities to end impunity for crimes against journalists to expedite investigations, and where possible, pursue prosecutions. The letter comes after charges were dropped on November 22 against the accused in the murders of journalist Ahmed Rilwan and blogger Yameen Rasheed on November 22.

FNJ settles KMG dispute after 60 days of action: On December 1, the Federation of Nepali Journalists (FNJ) announced the termination of protest action following the successful

JAB attend election training program: Members of the Journalists' Association of Bhutan attended a training program on November 18, addressing election-reporting skills ahead of National Elections in November and January. The event, organised by the Bodhi Media & Communications Institute, was supported by UNESCO, and designed to impart relevant knowledge and skills to Bhutanese journalists in covering elections in a free and fair manner.
